Safety Committee

In accordance with SCWWC approved BYLAWS, the Safety Committee will analyze, recommend, publish and inform members of club safety policies and procedures. This document describes the use of the Hazardous Material Information System (HMIS) ratings to inform members of the Health Hazard and Flammability of solvents, stains, finishes, resins and waxes commonly found in a working woodshop.

All solvents, stains, finishes, resins, and waxes used in the WoodShop will be evaluated using HMIS ratings and those ratings documented on a label affixed to the container. Finishes and resins used on lathe work will be evaluated by the Lathe Committee.

WoodClub members are encouraged to use these ratings when determining which materials will be used in their work. In some cases, the Safety Committee will exclude materials from use and storage in WoodClub facilities.

Health Hazard ratings:

- 0: No significant risk to health
- 1: Irritation or minor reversible injury possible
- 2: Temporary or minor injury may occur
- 2*: Prolonged exposure may result in permanent injury
- 3: Major injury is likely unless prompt action is taken
- 4: Life-threatening, major or permanent damage may result from a single overexposure

Flammability Hazard ratings:

- 0: Materials that will not burn
- 1: Materials that must be preheated before ignition will occur
- 2: Materials which must be moderately heated before ignition

will occur

- 3: Materials capable of ignition under normal temperature conditions
- 4: Flammable gases and very volatile flammable liquids

All solvents, stains, finishes, resins and waxes present in the WoodShop shall have an HMIS rating label affixed. Members who bring such materials into WoodClub facilities are responsible to contact a member of the Safety Committee to have a rating label affixed. The rating label will also identify recommended PPE when the material is being used.

All materials with Red Flammability ratings of 3 or 4 must be stored, when not in use, in a Fire Proof storage container. With the exception of Propane/MAPP gas cylinders; materials with Flammability rating of 4 must be used outside the WoodClub.

WoodClub members are encouraged to limit the use of materials with Blue Health ratings of 3; and to assure adequate ventilation is available during use. Materials with Blue Health ratings of 4 are not allowed to be present in WoodClub facilities.

SAFETY COMMITTEE MINUTES FOR JUNE 16, 2023

Ken shared samples of floor tape and signage he received from Creative Safety Supply. He also brought up the sign making materials offered by Creative Safety. More research into the sign making to acquire a more definite cost figure. One of the sample stripes, a 4" bright yellow will be placed on a black mat in the lathe area to test visibility, longevity, etc.

Existing Safety/Accident Reports: Kim brought up the thought of reviewing the existing safety/accident reports to isolate those machines which have a penchant for harming careless old woodworkers. Once these bad-boy machines are identified, they will receive the most attention in regard to signage, teachable moments, etc.

Purchasing Black/Yellow Tape: We wandered into the area of purchasing black/yellow tape to redefine the existing marking in the machine room. Some 3" rolls of tape will be purchased for the remarking process. Yellow paint should be available locally. It is believed that the shop will be closed for several days this summer for repair work by RH Johnson which should also provide the committee a quiet time to re-tape personal "do-not-disturb the operator "zones at the machines as old markings will be removed and floor areas cleaned for reapplication.

Various Poisons/Harmful Vapor Items: The next major discussion point concerned the various poisons/harmful vapors items hiding in our paint locker. Bob has spent considerable time and effort in this area. He will be relabeling and marking all the items in the paint locker with the Health-Flammability-Physical Hazard-Personal Protection Ratings of 0 to 4.Some of the hazardous materials are used by Maintenance and should be held in safe quarters in the Maintenance Room. Those items with a 3 or 4 rating should not be available to the general membership due to the general attitude that if it's in the paint locker, it must be approved for general use.

Airborne Irritants: The club membership must be aware that some members have allergies/sensitivities to odors, dust, fumes and other airborne irritants. Consequently rules about use of lacquers, polys, paint, shellac and more in the assemble room should be enforced. Signage will be provided for this.

Eyewash Station: It was pointed out that certain things like eyewash station should be tested on a monthly basis. The committee will be making a list of those items that need to be checked and providing it for future committees. Other areas include regular checking of fire extinguishers, electrical panels, hazardous materials waste containers and on and on.

The meeting essentially ended and several members wandered into the machinery room to check existing floor markings, wall signage and mats. Equipment has been moved and floor markings did not move with them. This will necessitate erasing some markings as well as re-furbishing others while redefining operator safety zones.

About Floor Mats: The floor mats were reviewed and the general thought was that all floor mats should have the yellow border like the mat at the sanding area. The banding does make the mat stand out and reduces the possibility of old people with hip and leg issues tripping. It must be recognized that

the club has some older members who, as the day lengthens, tend to drag a toe or even a foot. At that time, many things become a tripping hazard.

Lunch time loomed and those members left dissipated toward their individual lunch munching areas.
